P1 Student Spotlight: Anisa Shoghi

About Anisa

Q: Where did you grow up?

A: I was born in Tehran, the capital city of Iran, and I lived there until May 16, 2012 when I left Iran to come to the United States as a refugee. However, I lived in Vienna, Austria for about four months as part of the asylum process before I came to the U.S.

Q: Where did you complete you undergraduate degree?

A: I got my undergraduate degree from a university called Bahá'í Institute for Higher Education (BIHE) which is an underground university in Iran. I believe in the Bahá'í faith, a peaceful religion that Iran's government is explicitly against. Therefore, in Iran, Bahá'ís are under different forms of persecution including being denied of their right for higher education or having equal employment opportunities as other citizens of the country. BIHE was founded about ten years after Iran's revolution in response to these persecutions; however, it is still an underground university even up to this day.

Why
PHARMACY?

Q: Why did you choose pharmacy?

A: I was always interested in science since I was a child. That's why I chose Natural Sciences as my major at high school. My dream job at that time was becoming a physician. However, among all healthcare fields, BIHE only had pharmacy. So, it was my best available option. Work of a pharmacist in Iran is quite different from how it is in the US. As a result, although I was interested in the field of pharmacy in general, I didn't like working as a pharmacist. So, when I came to the US, at first, I wanted to continue my education by getting a master's and PhD in a pharmacy-related field. But two things changed my path. One was talking to my friends who were studying at pharmacy schools in the US, and second was working in a pharmacy here. These showed me that pharmacists are very involved in patient care and the outcome of treatment here. That's why I began to like pharmacy as a profession. So, I retook the pre-pharmacy prerequisites of the US PharmD programs at a community college in San Marcos, California and applied for pharmacy schools.

Q: What brought you to UCSF?

A: All the high-ranked pharmacy schools in California, including UCSF, require the international degrees to be evaluated by an institute called World Education Services (WES). Although many evaluating institutes in the US evaluate BIHE's degrees, WES does not. I was very lucky that by the time that I finished my pre-pharmacy prerequisites, UCSF had changed its admission process and required PCAT instead of an

undergraduate degree. So, among all pharmacy schools in California, I only applied to UCSF.

REFLECTIONS

Q: Is pharmacy school like what you imagined?

A: It mostly is as I imagined. I think the parts of pharmacy school that were new to me were mainly the parts that I hadn't experienced because I didn't go to four-year university here, such as class cabinet, different organizations, etc. The other part of the pharmacy school that I hadn't imagined, and I really enjoy, is the practicality of many of our classes and the focus on patient care. This just confirms for me the reason that pharmacists can be so involved in patient care in the US.

Jf Not Pharmacy...

Q: If you were not pursuing pharmacy, what would you be doing?

A: Before I learned how the job of a pharmacist in the United States is, I wanted to do research. After I got my BSc in Pharmacy from BIHE, I decided to continue my education. In the year 2011, I found a sponsor who would help with my expenses to get a master's and possibly a PhD in the

United Kingdom. I was in the final steps of getting admission for MSc in Research in Biomedical Mate-

rials from the University of Manchester when my application for asylum to the United States got approved and I came here. So, when I came to the US, my initial goal was continuing the same path that I had in mind when I was applying for the University of Manchester.
